Event co-ordinator Terry Moverley passionately championed the event's future and overall value, proposing a regimented and structured way to operate the competition - and within months the event not only re-emerged, but further re-invented itself in a bigger and better way.

More sponsorship, more club support and in turn, more nationwide prestige.

And the rest, as they say, is history.

In fact, this year marks the fifth anniversary of the revised tournament, a milestone cherished by Moverley and his fellow supporters, as with every year that ticks by, the event continually proves a drawcard for high performers, hosting no less than a dozen current and former internationals, among a fruitful mix of talented and rapidly rising stars of the sport from around the regions and representative squad members.

Held over the NZ-observed Waitangi Weekend (February 7-8),

the completion of a gruelling day of qualifying uncovered the top 16 combinations from an Impressive field of 32.

Coming in as the fifteenth qualifiers, both Cameron and Chapman were undoubtedly up against it from the start – matched against second qualifiers and former winners Vladimir Marsic and Tony Garelja, as knockout bowls got in to full swing.

However, a solid display of bowls saw the duo progress, moving on to defeat Dusty Reader and Steve Smith, before enduring an extra end showdown against the

Meanwhile, top qualifiers and pretournament favourites Justin Goodwin and Tony Grantham – both former New Zealand Blackjacks stars - had their run cut short at the hands of the tenacious composite pairing of Steve Cox and Grant Goodwin.



with Goodwin (Sr) prevailing 16-13 to earn a spot in the semi-final opposite quiet achievers Brian Wilson and Brad Reichert, of the Browns Bay Bowling Club.

A one-sided fixture saw Goodwin and Cox prevail in convincing fashion, setting up a mouthwatering clash with Cameron and Chapman on the Birkenhead greens, the final of which Chapman and Cameron emerged as tournament Cup Champions.

Cameron, speaking shortly after the final, was elated with the victory, signalling the win as special and indicating it was their

'Kerry and I would like to thank our personal sponsors (Emmie Swart Ltd) for kitting us out in the latest gears too, they did a mighty fine job,' the former international beamed.

The win saw Cameron and Chapman presented with the Champions Cup and a \$1500 winner's cheque, along with their name etched alongside previous winners including; Jamie Hill (2012), Vladimir Marsic (2013), Danny Delany (2014) and Tony Grantham (2015).

In other results, Reader and Smith took out the A Flight, defeating the powerful combination of Goodwin and Grantham 14-7, following their previous victory against O'Connor and Thorne in



the first round elimination matchup.

Meanwhile, all eyes will be at Birkenhead a little longer as the prestigious \$6,500 Birkenhead Open Women's Pairs unfolds this month (March 5-6), showcasing a star-studded field from around the country, in what is expected to be the biggest prize pool for a women's pair's tournament.
